

Heritage sites in Steveston Village

A Britannia Shipyards, National Historic Site,

The Britannia Shipyards National Historic Site is an authentic representation of a once-thriving community of canneries, boat yards, residences and stores. Many of the buildings date back to 1885 and tell the stories of multi-ethnic residents and workers at the ABC Cannery and then the Britannia Shipyard.

B Gulf of Georgia Cannery, National Historic Site,

The Gulf of Georgia Cannery commemorates the history of the West Coast fishing industry. Exhibits, displays, artefacts and machinery give visitors a sense of how the cannery must have looked and sounded during its years of operations.

C Steveston Museum & Visitor Centre,

Built in 1905 in the heart of the village, Steveston Museum and Visitor Centre's iconic cream, red and white building is a true heritage gem. Originally Richmond's first bank, the building is now a museum, visitor centre and post office. Continue into the Japanese Fishermen's Benevolent Society Building and among the exhibits, explore the triumphs and challenges experienced by the local Japanese-Canadian community.

D Steveston Interurban Tram Building,

The Interurban Tram is the largest artefact in the Richmond Museum Collection. Built in 1912, the Interurban Tram car #1220 serviced the Lulu Island-Vancouver route until 1958. It is now resting on its original rails in a light-filled building specifically designed to house it.

E Branscombe House,

Branscombe House is a restored Edwardian style structure and is one of the earliest homes built in the area. It is significant for its historical association to the development of Steveston, both as a residential building and through its connection to the Branscombe family's general store.

F London Heritage Farm,

Overlooking the south arm of the Fraser River, the picturesque four-acre site features London Farm House and a park which illustrate rural life in Richmond between 1890 and 1920. The site also includes beautiful heritage perennial flowers, a kitchen and herb garden, the restored Spraggs family barn, an outside exhibit of large, antique farm equipment, chickens, honey bees and community gardens.


